I'm excited to serve through the mission, dedicated toward implementing sustainable solutions to health and education disparities.

As I look back on the 2012-2013 year, I am excited by the progress we have made within the communities of the Kasarani Region. Through the support of USAID, we have implemented a community outreach program on the prevention and education of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV). This program encompassed a holistic approach to SGBV management and prevention, providing comprehensive medical services to women and children in need. We have also received the support of the Ford Foundation to enhance the trainings of the police and the judiciary in responding to SGBV against women and girls. Police officers were trained on collection techniques for forensic evidence, and judiciary officers were trained on laws related to SGBV. Further, during our 3rd Annual International Women's Day event, the women of Kenya were recognized for their voice and leadership.

Looking forward, KWCWC and the James R. Jordan Foundation International will continue providing services to meet the health and education needs of women and children affected by gender-based violence and HIV/AIDS in Kenya. We will continue to support the Government of Kenya and to initiate the SGBV prevention network through the District Gender Department. We further look forward to continuing to raise support of the Hospital and to begin construction. I invite you to join us in the upcoming year and offer the opportunity to again be a part of the success of the James R. Jordan Foundation International and the communities it serves.

KWCWC joined hands with Philips and the Ministry of Medical Services to host a tailor-made clinical training workshop on maternal and prenatal care at Mathare Health Centre. For two days, local healthcare workers were trained on how to accomplish safe childbirths and improve maternal and infant care. Over 180 expectant mothers were scanned and had the chance to see their children for the first time.

## **Financial Report**

James R. Jordan Foundation International accomplished our goal of fiscal excellence through the economic barriers during the past year. JRJFI practices good stewardship with all funds entrusted to its mission of building capacity in developing communities worldwide. Using funds wisely allows JRJFI to serve more families and communities in Kenya's underserved areas.

The Foundation's goals and objectives serve as the blueprint for its financial management policies, to achieve and maintain fiscal stability. All resources are effectively used in a fiscally responsible manner to ensure adequate funding for the services, programming, and infrastructure necessary to meet the Foundation's present and future needs.

Due to development and administrative costs operating at 18%, the Foundation was able to allocate 57% of our total budget to programs.

#### Revenue

JRJFI is a tax-exempt 501(c)3 nonprofit organization supported by people who believe in its work. As JRJFI is not endowed, it is through this continued generosity and support that we will be able to venture into new programming and remain sustainable. Support comes in the form of contributions from individuals, corporations, foundations and other organizations. Government assistance is also welcome. JRJFI participates in various government programs from the US Department of State, the US Department of Justice, and the US Agency for International Development.


#### Expense

JRJFI classifies expense in three primary categories: program expense, planning expense and management /general expense.




### Financial Breakdowns

# Report From The Field: USAID "Addressing Sexual and Gender Based Violence"

Beginning in May 2011, the US Agency for International Development signed a two-year cooperative agreement with JRJFI to provide sensitization and awareness creation on prevention of gender-based violence under a community outreach program concept.

Promoting women's rights and reducing gender-based violence are necessary in the realization of Millennium Development Goals (MDGs) and in the development of the country. By reducing gender-based violence through prevention interventions, the cost and burden of managing gender-based violence by the country will be reduced with subsequent long term positive impact through behavior change.

**13,656** Children trained and educated on genderbased violence awareness and prevention.

**18,086** Adults and healthcare providers trained through USAID programming efforts.

## International Women's Day

March 18, 2013 marked the James R. Jordan Foundation International and the Kenya Women and Children's Wellness Centre's 3rd Annual International Women's Day Luncheon. With over 450 people in attendance, we celebrated the accomplishments of women throughout the years, as well as acknowledged the challenges women continue to face. Speakers included Mr. Karim Jamal, Starlit Insurance Brokers; Mr. Vincent Rapando, Secretary General of the Africa Conference on Volunteer Action for Peace and Development; Mr. Rene Kiamba, Johnson & Johnson; US Ambassador to Kenya Mr. Robert Godec; and Mr. Bob Collymore, Safaricom Ltd. Performances were also given by Eric Wainaina and school children from Kasarani.







## Kenya Women and Children's Wellness Centre: KWCWC

The Kenya Women and Children's Wellness Centre is the inaugural project of James R. Jordan Foundation International. The Centre includes the construction of new buildings to meet the increasing demand for patient care, medical training, education and research, and equipment upgrades.

KWCWC, under the supervision of JRJFI, is also a newly established Nairobi-based nonprofit organization focused on improving Kenya's healthcare infrastructure, reducing the spread of HIV/AIDS and gender-based violence, and training the next generation of medical professionals. Currently, KWCWC, through its community outreach program, addresses sexual and gender-based violence.





## Ford Foundation: Training Police and Judiciary

Over the past year JRJFI, through KWCWC, has conducted a community outreach program, enhancing the police and judiciary's skills and knowledge in responding to sexual and gender-based violence against women and girls in Kasarani and its environs.

- Over sixty police officers have been trained on the collection and preservation of forensic evidence, and have a stronger understanding of the linkages between health officers and investigative officers.
- Through a partnership with the Department of Public Prosecution, 175 prosecutors underwent training on forensic evidence and its related laws, and over 90 voluntary children's officers were trained in assisting children with violence-related matters.

The project has made tremendous efforts toward improving the quality of data collected by government line ministries, police, children's officers, and the judiciary. Services rendered by police have also significantly improved and the numbers of gender-violence cases reported and documented have increased.
